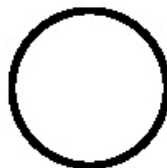

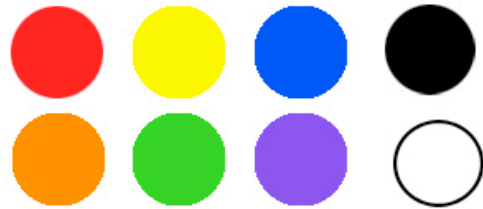

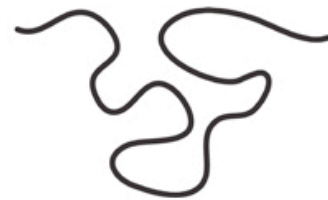


Collage: Bits and pieces of things glued onto paper.

Color



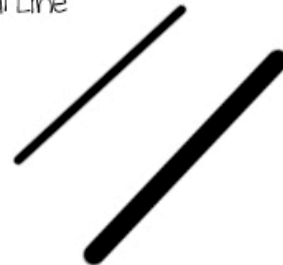
Curved Lines



Darker: Mixing a color with black makes it darker.



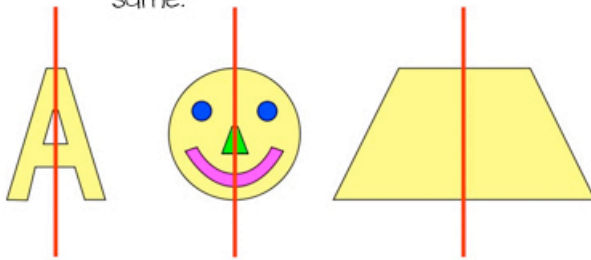
Diagonal Line

Even Balance: Both Halves are equal.
Left side and right side are the same.



Fiber: A material used to make baskets and cloth. Grass, yarn, and straw are kinds of fibers.

Form: A three-dimensional object, such as a cube or a ball. Form is an element of art. Form may be depicted on a 2-D surface.



Free-Form Shapes: Irregular and uneven shapes.



Geometric Shapes: Are circles, rectangles, squares, triangles and so on - have the clear edges one achieves when using tools to create them.

Movement: give the feeling of motion and to guide the viewer's eyes throughout the artwork.

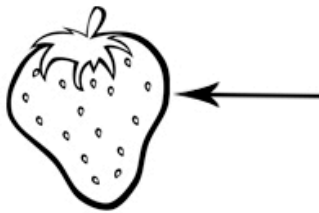


Mural: A painting done on a wall

Shape: *Refer to Free-Form Shapes, Geometric Shapes.

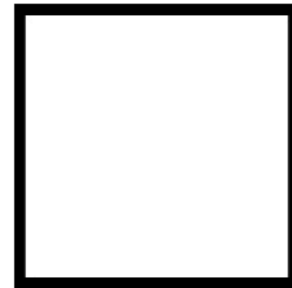
Smooth line

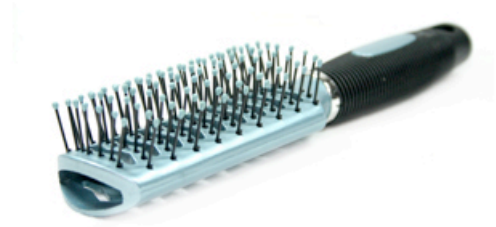

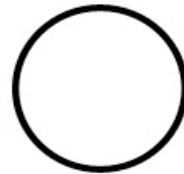
Unity: A feeling of 'belonging together' -

are pleased to see it.



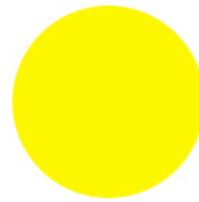
Visual Texture: Texture you can see, but
